Magnifica Humanitas:

Magnifica Humanitas, the first encyclical released by Pope Leo XIV, marks a qualitative leap beyond its predecessors. John Paul II spoke of the media, Benedict XVI of the digital continent, and Francis of the technocratic paradigm and AI at the G7. Leo XIV integrates AI into the very structure of social teaching, using it as a lens to rethink all its principles — from the common good to social justice.

The real wager is not whether artificial intelligence will ever become human, but whether human intelligence will remain human in the face of the temptation toward absolute performance.

The narrative coup of the encyclical appears in its opening pages, when Leo XIV places two biblical icons at the center of the text: the Tower of Babel and the rebuilding of Jerusalem's walls in the Book of Nehemiah.
